### **Arboricultural Assessment Report**

### 1. INTRODUCTION

Skilled Trees Services has been commissioned by Department of Veterans' Affairs for the Office of War Graves North Queensland to undertake an Arboricultural Report on 12 trees/areas located at the North Queensland Garden of Remembrance located within Anzac Park along the Strand.

#### 2. BRIEF

Skilled Trees Services was commissioned to inspect the trees located at the above mentioned site to provide information to the Office of War Graves North Queensland on the health and register of the trees as well as an appropriate course of action to address any issues pertaining to the health of the trees and to be made aware of any associated risks to person or property

The scope of work includes:

- Assessment of tree characteristics, current health and defects
- Evidence of any disease or defects
- Assessment of relative risk to human safety or property
- · Recommendations on actions if required

#### 3. TREE SURVEY

### 3.1 METHODOLOGY

Skilled Trees Services follows industry best practice in the assessment of trees. The inspection method used was a Visual Tree Assessment (VTA) method (Mattheck and Breloer 1994) and applying a risk matrix that compares with Australian Standards while considering the tree characteristics, health and structural form. The Assessment was undertaken from the ground to determine tree health, structure and form, digital photographs were taken for photographic documentation. The report is not a guarantee, but a professional opinion of the current condition of the trees and the potential risk of harm posed by them and appropriate strategies.

#### 3.2 BACKGROUND

A site inspection was conducted on 27<sup>th</sup> March 2020 at NQ Garden of Remembrance (Fig 1 – Site Map). The following report reflects on the tree inspection that took place on this day at around 12.30pm in the early afternoon, it was a sunny and fine day. The target site was noted to have significant trees within the site. This report covers the smaller area around the memorial walls. (Fig 2 – Target Site). Having trees on any site is an implied risk but also benefits the environment and are aesthetically pleasing. Risks will be addressed, and courses of action will be suggested.

#### 5. FINDINGS

**Tree 1** is over 40 years old *Terminalia catappa* (Beach Almond) it has fair to good leaf coverage with minimal deadwood, but the trunk is showing signs of bad decay with cavities present. Live tissue measured only 500mm with possible white ant activity present it would be highly recommended to investigate this further by using a Resistograph to ascertain the extent of the Decay and density of the heartwood. (FIG 3 - 5)

**Tree 2** is also a 40+ year old *Terminalia catappa* (Beach Almond) that has similar findings to the above Tree 1 with Live Tissue at 1100mm and further investigation required to ascertain decay and density of the trunk. (FIG 6-7)

**Tree 3** is a *Ficus Benghalensis* (Banyan Fig) which would be 80+ years old it has significant aerial root damage and major deadwood in the top of the crown, while these can be signs of Ganoderma or Phellinus, no fruiting bodies where seen during the inspection which indicated that it may be Phellinus which is a root disease. Further testing could be helpful in establishing the correct diagnoses. Another condition that could have caused this damage may be associated with the raised level of soil/vegetation around the fig. (FIG 8 – 10)

**Tree 4** is *Clausia rosea* (Autograph Tree) it is multi-trunked with no signs of pest or disease but has a suppressed crown due to competing larger trees in the close vicinity, it has minimal deadwood that requires no attention at this stage. (FIG 11 - 12)

**Tree 5** is a *Ficus benjamina* (Weeping Fig) multi-trunked tree in good health, tree has very low scaffold branching and surface roots present that while are not intrusive or a major trip hazard at present time will become in the future. It is the Arborists opinion that certain lower scaffold branches be removed to acquire a major uplift to proactively encourage a good retention outcome in the future. Some roots could be ground and top dressed, but a qualified arborist would be required to establish the extent of grinding and to which roots. (FIG 13 - 16)

**Tree 6** is also a *Ficus benjamina* (Weeping Fig) in good health. It is suggested that this tree be removed for 3 major reasons, the first being the surrounding competing vegetation the second being the root system that is quite significant on this tree with the surrounding concrete memorials and thirdly the area with the surrounding vegetation would generally benefit. This would be done as a proactive measure for the long-term retention and health of the other significant tree species in close proximity and to protect the memorial.

If this is not something that can be warranted it is suggested that the following would be a minimum to occur, removal of large scaffold branch that hangs very low over memorial to the south of the park and grinding of specific roots as per qualified arborist recommendations and top dressing around the memorial boarder. (FIG 17 - 19)

Tree 7 is a very young *Calophyllum inophyllum* (Mastwood) this particular specimen was not staked at the time of the inspection and Arborist cannot ascertain if it had previously, due to this absence of structural support the tree had grown on an angle that is not conducive to the trees stability in the future, it is suggested at this time to formative prune and to further inspect whether the tree can be progressively staked to encourage a better structure. (FIG 20)

**Tree 8** is *Terminalia catappa* (Beach Almond) it is a mature tree has no evidence of pest or disease, it is weight baring to one side that should be reduced to balance the crown and also requires to be pruned away from the path lighting for clearances and visibility for the foot traffic frequenting the area. (FIG 21)

**Tree 9** is a *Pterocarpus indicus* (Indian Rosewood) which has good leaf coverage all over the crown, minimal deadwood and an occlusion that is a testament to the health of this particular specimen, there are surface roots present that could pose a trip hazard, mowing hazard or future intrusion closer to the memorial that could be ground down and top dressed if favourable. (FIG 22)

**Trees 10** are *Dillenia alata* (Red Beech Tree) in a group of 4 they are in good health with no signs of pest or disease, slight uplift over paths that surround these trees would be appropriate as formative pruning. (FIG 23)

**Tree 11** is *Terminalia catappa* (Beach Almond) it is growing on a lean but has somewhat corrected itself overtime, it has leaf loss with poor coverage and minimal deadwood but with no presence of pest or disease and a suitable amount of live tissue it is recommended that this tree just be monitored at this stage. (FIG 24)

**Trees 12** are a group of 3 x *Cocos nucifera* (Coconut Palms) while it was noted there are "spike marks" this is a type of climbing tool used to ascend the palm there was no evidence of white ants at the time of inspection. All 3 x palms where full of mature fruit that is at the stage of falling. (FIG 25)




Fig 10. Tree 3 - Fig Tree






Fig 11. Tree 4 - Autograph Tree

## Arboricultural Assessment and Report

RE: Updated Assessment on health, risk and retention of 2 x trees Address: North Queensland Garden of Remembrance, The Strand.

Commissioned by: Office of Australia War Graves

Date: 23/10/2020

A further proactive visual tree assessment and investigation was undertaken from ground level on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> of September at the above address. The trees that are being reassessed are 2 x mature *Ficus benjaminas* (Weeping Fig). (Images 1-6)

This amendment is to the previous report undertaken on the 27<sup>th</sup> March 2020 regarding tree 5 and 6, previously it was recommended to remove tree 6 and to substantially prune tree 5 to reduce the risk to infrastructure damage.

It was observed on the most recent inspection that the root growth over the last 6 months was noted to be more vigorous than previously thought and heading in the direction of the memorial wall and due to the fact that this cannot be reasonably managed by moving the monument or managing the subject tree or root system to an injury acceptable arboricultural practice it is of significant concern.

Tree 5 and 6 are seen to be causing measurable damage and safety concerns of trip hazard especially for the elderly and will continue to further damage the memorial wall as subject trees mature.

Taking into account the projected height and span of the trees in question and the surrounding size of the area, the subject trees do not fall into table planting area guidelines as they are only around 40% of their maximum height and spread. (Table 1)

The option of dressing the area with top soil to eliminate the risk of tripping would not be successful due to not being able to grow any vegetation under the trees to prevent erosion and run off and this will also do nothing to protect the memorial wall from any future damage.

Considering the previous points, it is recommended that both tree 5 and 6 be removed and are replaced with a suitable shade trees like:



#### Hi Sebastian and Ted.

Thank you for meeting with me at the North Queensland Garden of Remembrance (GRM) on Tuesday morning Sebastian, and thank you for the introduction to Eddie. It is always a pleasure to meet with others when there is a shared passion for horticulture and arboriculture.

I feel comfortable to say that we are both on the same page regarding the existing horticulture at the GRM and the potential for the site in the future. Out of interest, I've included three photos of the site back when it opened in 2005 and a shot when the TCC's tree-gang came onto the site to remove a Ficus benjamina in October of 2006. This will give you some kind of idea as to how much impact the two large Ficus benjaminas have these days.

At the meeting we discussed Adam Cozzitorto's (Skilled Trees) recent report and agreed that the two Terminalia mulleri in the south-western corner of the site are not going to improve and that their best was in the past. We discussed obtaining Resistograph measurements of both trees at several different heights along the trunk to determine how solid the heartwood is.

Measurements obtained by previous TCC Arborists in 2012 suggest the heartwood at breast height was solid enough. We did discuss removing these two trees over the next 3-5 years and start planning what tree species are possible for replacements. I would like to offer an early suggestion of Colvillea racemosa or Caesalpinia ferrea, the former for its spectacular show of flowers at this time of year and the latter for its attractive trunk and ornamental form and shape. I can also propagate both if required?

We also discussed the two large Ficus benjamina which are dominating the landscape and causing numerous WHS issues from lifting the pathway, to causing trip hazards and not allowing turf to grow up to the walls where OAWG official commemorations are placed. We both witnessed the two visitors who came to pay their respects where one remained on the footpath because the earth was muddy and not appealing to walk on. These trees whilst providing some nice shade from the North Queensland sun, are now impacting on the experience of visitors to the site in making the overall look of the site quite dark and intimidating. We agreed that removal of both these trees will brighten up the site, and allow improvements to be made in the overall horticulture of the garden beds and improve the visitor's experience.

Once again, getting in early, may I suggest Cerbera manghas to replace the central Ficus in the garden bed. A tree that works well as a small street tree, with an attractive flower and a lovely scent.

The next step is to meet with you Ted at the GRM and discuss what we may need to put together in regards to exemptions from DES?

I've included Dr Matthew 477 into this email as he is the OAWG Assistant Director – Infrastructure, Assets & Projects.



Hi Matthew,

OAWG have been granted approval to remove the two Ficus benjaminas at the GRM. Before I jump in and have trees ripped out and infrastructure removed, I thought I'd seek National Office approval and open a discussion as to how OAWG move forward.

I currently have around \$30k underspend which I'm confident will be absorbed in the redevelopment of the GRM. My current plan is to:

- Engage Programmed (PPS) to remove the existing irrigation, paving and planting from the garden bed and replace with a substitute setup so the irrigation will continue to work for the remaining beds. This will be a ad-hoc procurement issued with a work order. Budget \$2k.
- Engage PPS electrician to remove existing light and prepare underground cabling for tree removal. Budget \$1k
- Approach three arboreal providers on the OAWG Hort panel to provide quotes for removal of the two trees, stump grinding and canopy thinning to the remaining Pterocarpus Indica.
   Est budget \$20k
- Engage PPS to re-establish garden bed. \$2k.
- · Re-turf \$10k.

I'm uncertain as to how much infrastructure repair will be required. I envisage that some paving will require re-laying and some of the concrete pathway may be damaged. Some minor irrigation repairs will require attention and some of the kwik-kerbing may be disrupted.

Post- removal, I would like to engage Suzan Quigg Landscaping and/or others on the Hort Panel to provide designs for re-establishing trees and garden beds. This will require further discussion. Two options here are:

- Basic re-design using existing infrastructure and design principles, essentially re-planting the central bed. (can be organised in-house with PPS at around \$5k)
- Have drawings and re-design entire site complimenting existing horticulture and establishing new garden design and principles. Drawings to cost \$5k, implemented landscaping to cost \$5k - \$150k dependent of extent of change.

## Time frame:

- · Have garden bed/electrical work and quotes by end of January
- Tree removal by end of February. (I plan on being on leave and would like this component supervised by OAWG)
- Returf and garden bed repair by end of March.
- Drawings for new designs by end of March.
- Redesign and re-landscaping ongoing.

Again, I plan on being on leave during February. I would seek support and advice for this project from Craig and would envisage that Craig would be able to step-in during any absence by me. Happy to discuss further and happy to receive support and advice on any of the above. Regards,

If so, the Findings and Recommendations are probably not sufficiently conclusive to allow DES to form an idea as to what we're asking and what the result will be. I can still put it to them as is, but I expect they would initially respond with a question about the qualifications of the report's author. I don't see any issues, except that in the findings section, the author leaves it to a 'qualified arborist' to supply additional detail as to what works would be carried out to each tree. DES might also balk at outright removal, where the report leaves room for flexibility (and says the trees are both in good health) - they'd be keen for us to take a minimallyinvasive approach, or at least to have stronger justification for going farther. The bottom line is, a specific path forward needs to be settled on, and the report needs to back that up, and DES needs to know exactly what we're proposing to do, so they can come back yea or nay.
