Minister Kousoulis,

The need for reliable access to proper high-speed internet is essential across Nova Scotia, particularly many rural areas, has been underlined during the last number of months. Unfortunately, there remain many communities in my constituency that are underserved or unserved.

For the business community, this puts them at a competitive disadvantage. For many constituents, it is a major inconvenience not being able to check their emails, do their online banking or work from home, as many Nova Scotians were required to do throughout the height of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Students will be returning to school very shortly. As post-secondary students begin to learn more about their educational institution's plans for this year's learning experience, I have discovered that some courses and programs will be taught on-site, while some are offered exclusively online.

The guidelines from some institutions will limit students' movement on campus, certainly making for a much different experience this year. Students learning online do not want to live such an isolated experience away from family and friends. For some post-secondary students in Argyle-Barrington, online learning from home will not only be challenging, but nearly impossible due to poor and unreliable internet access. Unfortunately, there are students who may opt not to attend college or university this year due to the technology barrier.

I would like to explore options to support post-secondary students in my constituency who decide to learn from home this year, to ensure that they have the internet access required for them to be successful in their studies.
