What's Happened So Far with the Budget?

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People with greatest likelihood of success were already talking to the Councilmembers, key departmental staff and the Mayor about what they wanted to see in the next budget (FY 2016).

❖ January 2015--February 2015

 Councilmembers created memos outlining their priorities, IBA summarized them and a Council priorities memo was submitted to the Mayor

❖ February 2015—March 2015

Chief Operating Officer, Chief Financial Officer and Mayor work with City Departments to gather information about what the Mayor would propose for the FY 2016 Budget.

❖ April 14, 2015

Mayor Kevin Faulconer released his FY 2016 budget proposal.

MAY IS BUDGET ADVOCACY MONTH!

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❖ May 4th-May 8th, 2015

 Council meets as the Budget Review Committee (BRC) to review the budget.

❖ May 11th, 2015

BRC meets at 6pm to hear public testimony on the budget.

♦ May 19th, 2015

Mayor issues a revised budget based information gathered through the budget review process & BRC reviews it.

♦ May 22nd, 2015

Council members submit final priorities for revision to the IBA.

JUNE IS BUDGET ADOPTION MONTH!

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❖ June 3rd

IBA presents a final review of the budget to the City Council

❖ June 8th

- The Council votes to make any changes.
- The Council votes to pass a final budget.

❖ June 10th-June 16th

The Mayor can veto the budget items and Council override of a veto requires 6 out of 9 votes.

Basic Facts

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Total	revenues:	\$2.91	billion
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•CIP budget: \$0.38 billion

Total expenditures: \$3.21 billion

Fire-Rescue

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Concerns: Slow fire-rescue response times in parts of the City especially low-income/high poverty neigborhoods.

- Funds the Bayside Fire Station (\$5M)
- Funds 2 Fast Response Squads (\$1.2M)
- Funds staffing @ Skyline Temp. Fire Station (\$773K)
- Funds Mobile Operation Detail--Gaslamp (\$100K)

Police

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Concerns: A desire to have the police serve and protect all communities equally.

- Increases funding by \$16M and adds 45 employees compared to FY15.
- ❖ 50% of new positions are civilian positions which is supposed to officers to do more patrolling less deskwork.
- * NO dedicated funding for community-oriented policing.

Transportation & Storm Water

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Concerns: Lack or low quality of sidewalks, streetlights, potholes or otherwise bad streets, bike and pedestrian safety, inadequate tree trimming.

- Adds \$25M and 104 full-time employees to the Dept.
- Funds sidewalk repair and replacement (\$3.8M)
- Provides funds for tree trimming (\$1.6M)
- Funds 1 Code compliance officer for graffiti (\$500K)

Transportation & Storm Water (continued)

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Mayor's Proposal (continued)

- Funds street light & circuit improvements (\$3.7M)
- Funds 2 staff to create and maintain bike lanes (\$300K)
- Continues funding for assessing all sidewalks (\$173K)

Libraries

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Concerns: Inadequate budget for materials, need greater access to the Internet and have a need for new or expanded libraries.

- Decreases the funding for library materials (\$200K)
- Increases funding for internet bandwidth (\$98K)
- Shifts staff from branch libraries to the Central Library.

Libraries—CIP Related

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FY 2015 Projects in Progress

- San Ysidro Library—looking to buy land
- Skyline Hills Library—groundbreaking summer 2015

FY 2016 CIP Funding Proposed

- Kensington/Normal Heights(\$75K needs: \$2.3M)
- Mission Hills/Hillcrest (\$70K needs: \$12M)
- San Carlos (\$140K needs: \$19.5M)
- Tierrasanta Library Expansion (\$170K needs: \$295K)

Park & Recreation

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Concerns: Need for more park space, problems with disability accessibility and need for new playgrounds and other equipment. Need for increased hours at recreation centers

- Overall funding increases by \$5.4M
- Provides funding for improving existing parks (\$2M)
- Increase hours (45 to 60) @ 16 large centers (\$1M)
- Funds park & playground needs assessments (\$300K)
- Extends Teen Nights to 5 centers (\$39K)

Neighborhood Code Compliance

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Concerns: Slumlords and failure to enforce existing laws related to substandard housing, mini-dorms and illegal dumping.

Relevant Departments: Developments Services (most) & Environmental Services (illegal dumping)

- Adds 4 housing code enforcement positions (\$334K)
- Adds 3 medical marijuana compliance officers (\$222K)
- Funds Citywide illegal dumping program (\$800K)

Other CBA Priorities

Living wage ordinance enforcement

- Staffing positions to enforce the living wage ordinance (LWO)
- July 1, 2015—Living will be \$14.43 (\$12.02 salary +\$2.41 health)
- Relevant Department: Internal Operations/Purchasing and Contracting

Community benefits policy @ Civic San Diego for publicly subsidized projects:

- Set-aside funds for affordable housing and ensure that affected residents' and the City Council's input are included on all projects
- Require that contractors pay prevailing wages for construction positions and living wage for services




