Why Pardon O. Henry?

America needs the pardon power reinvigorated now more than ever. The United States over the last 20 years has transformed into the incarceration capital of the planet, housing five percent of the world's population and

25 percent of its prisoners. Meanwhile, Barack Obama has given fewer pardons than any president since James Garfield, who was assassinated seven months into office.

This petition seeks to call attention to the waning use of executive clemency in the justice system by invoking the plight of America's most famous short-story writer, who was convicted on embezzlement charges at an Austin bank in 1897.
