Post-election Peace Work in the Time of Biden

Donald Trump may leave the White House kicking and screaming, but *we do* have a new president who, compared to Trump, is intelligent, experienced, and seems empathetic. Many think he is also a good listener. We certainly hope so, as he's not likely to embrace a truly progressive agenda unless he feels our legions pushing him in that direction.

President-elect Joe Biden has never been known as a friend of the peace movement. He was a supporter of the Iraq War, voted for the Crime Bill, and supported Obama's war on Libya. However, he has promised to make some significant moves on his first day in office which we can all applaud.

- Rejoin the Paris Climate Agreement
- Rejoin the World Health Organization
- Rejoin the Iran Nuclear Deal
- · Renew a commitment to DACA

We also can strongly encourage President Biden to take climate change very seriously and move forward quickly with his energy plan, which is basically based on the Green New Deal. *All* fossil fuels must be left in the ground - no fracking, Joe. We can insist that he rapidly reinstate and strengthen environmental regulations removed by President Trump. He can promote criminal justice reform and an end to police brutality with national policing standards. And his proposals to improve our national access to health care give us an opening to work for universal coverage.

But in the area of foreign policy and militarization, we have a lot of work to do. We must urge President

Biden to pull back on vindictive economic sanctions against Iran, Venezuela, Cuba and North Korea which are causing real suffering to their people. Sanctions are a form of war. The increasing tensions with Iran must be reversed to avoid war. We should appeal for a return to President Obama's efforts to normalize relations with Cuba. The US role in the war on Yemen must stop. The rights of the Palestinian people have to be recognized. We must let President Biden know that the continued demonization of Russia and China can lead to a major and catastrophic war and must end.

Time is running out on two fronts - climate change and nuclear conflict. The Doomsday Clock, which is now a precarious 100 seconds to midnight, must be reversed. Biden can take our nuclear weapons off hair-trigger alert and announce a no-first-use policy. He can order that on day one. He must halt the ongoing modernization (rebuilding) of the US nuclear weapons stockpile started under Obama and restore arms control treaties such as New START, Intermediate Nuclear Forces and Open Skies. And he should be urged to sign the UN Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. (See article on pg. 3.)

Underlying so much of this agenda is the outof-control military spending which can be shifted to basic domestic needs and addressing the climate crisis. Peace Action has long called for new national priorities and a foreign policy based on national sovereignty, diplomacy, negotiations and human rights. Now is the time to make our voices heard loud and clear. We must be prepared to fight for a just foreign policy, disarmament and strong climate action.

Cuba, Covid 19 and the Nobel Peace Prize

The Henry Reeve International Medical Brigades of Cuba have been nominated for the 2021 Nobel Peace Prize. This nomination has been made

in recognition of Cuba's heroic efforts to combat COVID-19—not just in their own country, where they have lost only 131 people to COVID out of a population of 11.3 Million—but around the world where they were needed, particularly in impoverished countries with inadequate health care systems.

Begun in 2005 when the government of Cuba offered to send experts in disaster relief to Hurricane Katrina-ravaged New Orleans (only to be refused by the US), the Henry Reeve medical teams have been providing essential support to countries struggling with Dengue fever, Ebola, earthquake damage, and systemic inadequacies in delivering routine healthcare.

Since the beginning of the COVID pandemic, Cuba has sent almost 4,000 members of these brigades to 39 different countries, where they have provided critical support to local health teams and sometimes have provided the only professional medical care available. They have done this at great risk to themselves—in fact, while no Cuban medics have died from COVID in Cuba, four members of the Henry Reeve Brigades have died from COVID while working abroad.

Most of the world has recognized the bravery and selflessness of these Cuban medical heroes. But the government of the United States, still determined to reverse the Cuban revolution and impose a regime subservient to Washington, has countered the popularity of the Cuban doctors with charges of "human trafficking" and "slavery."

Cuba responds that the Brigade members are all volunteers, they receive their regular pay while out of the country, and they earn an extra stipend for their foreign service. There is nothing forced or "slavish" about it. Poor countries receive these services at no charge; countries that have the resources are asked

to pay. Most of the income goes back into the Cuban healthcare system which has the highest doctor/patient ratio in the world, the world's largest medical school, and advanced biomedical research with breakthrough treatments for cancer, diabetes, and COVID. About 25% of the fee is used for the staff's stipends.

In contrast to our healthcare "non-system" built around making a profit, the Cuban system rests on the principle that healthcare is a right, and the chance to save lives is the most important reward. It is this example of what the Cubans have accomplished that threatens American supporters of our for-profit healthcare industry, and why it is important for us to help get the truth out to the American people.

50th Nation Ratifies Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons

In a huge success for the movement to abolish nuclear weapons, the UN Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons will go into effect on Fri., Jan. 22. On Oct. 24 Honduras became the 50th nation to ratify the treaty, allowing it to enter into force 90 days later, Jan. 22, 2021,



becoming binding international law! For those nations that are party to it, the treaty prohibits the development, testing, production, stockpiling, stationing, transfer, use and threat of use of nuclear weapons, as well as assistance and encouragement to the prohibited activities. For nuclear armed states joining the treaty, it provides for a time-bound framework for negotiations leading to the verified and irreversible elimination of their nuclear weapons program.

Although 122 UN member states voted to adopt the treaty, it has not been signed by any of the world's nine nuclear powers — Britain, China, France, India, Israel, North Korea, Pakistan, Russia and the United States. Still, the nuclear ban treaty sets a precedent for peace through world law and stigmatizes nuclear weapons. Now our work continues.

All of the other 122 countries that signed onto the treaty need to be pushed to ratify it. The international pressure for nuclear disarmament can build and, with a lot of work from the grassroots, could shame the nuclear nations to seriously consider joining the rest of the world in rejecting nuclear weapons forever.

It is up to us to make sure that corporations, governments and the public know that nuclear weapons are now illegal and that they need to stand on the right side of history.

Let's Celebrate and Educate!

Peace Action of Wisconsin has been asked by a coalition of groups- International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons, the Oak Ridge Environmental Peace Alliance (OREPA), Nukewatch, the Nuclear Resister and the Alliance for Nuclear Accountability (ANA) - to celebrate/observe the "Entry into Force" of the Treaty to Prohibit Nuclear Weapons. We will be part of a coordinated, nationwide public action that spotlights the treaty as a victory for humanity on this historic day.

In Milwaukee, we will be marking this globally important event with an observance beginning at noon on Friday, Jan. 22, in front of the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company in Milwaukee, 700 E. Wisconsin Ave.

According to *Don't Bank on the Bomb*, Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance has \$1.1 billion invested in companies that are part of the nuclear weapons industrial complex. Most of it is in stock in Boeing, Honeywell International, Bae Systems and Huntington Ingalls Systems. We will call out Northwestern Mutual for its complicity in the development and production of nuclear weapons.

From there we will walk to the Federal Court House, 517 E. Wisconsin, and deliver a message to Senator Ron Johnson. Then we proceed to Rep. Gwen Moore's office, 250 E. Wisconsin, and on to Water and Wisconsin to Chase Bank and Wells Fargo Bank, two other big investors in nuclear weapons (\$20 million each).

Of course, we will carefully social distance and wear masks. The wind coming off of Lake Michigan should blow any corona viruses all the way to Iowa. **Please join us on this historic date.**

The Militarization of Africa

Why are we concerned about the militarization of Africa by AFRICOM?

The U.S. military established AFRICOM (United States African Command) on October 1, 2008 as part of Pentagon command operations throughout the planet. They claim that combat operations in Africa are to counter violent extremist organizations which they say are finding safe haven throughout African countries.

However, the truth is that the U.S. uses military force to impose control of African land, resources and labor to service the needs of U.S. multi-national corporations and the wealthy in the United States. It is part of a new colonization of Africa.

AFRICOM was established in the months before Barack Obama assumed office as the first Black President of the United States. A majority of African nations—led by the Pan-African government of Libya—rejected AFRICOM, forcing the new command to instead work out of Europe. But with the U.S. and NATO attack on Libya that led to the destruction of that country and the murder of its leader Muammar Gaddafi in 2011, corrupt African leaders began to allow AFRICOM forces to operate in their countries and establish military-to-military relations with the United States.

Despite the Pentagon's claims that AFRICOM has a "light footprint," recent documents reveal that the U.S. has at least 29 military bases in 15 countries across the continent.

Jan. 25 - World Says No to War on Yemen

Joint Statement from Stop the War Coalition (UK), and US groups-Action Corp, Yemeni Alliance Committee, Yemen Relief and Reconstruction Foundation, CODEPINK, Just Foreign Policy, Voices for Creative Nonviolence.

Since 2015, the Saudi-led bombing and blockade of Yemen have killed tens of thousands of people and devastated the country. The U.N. calls this **the largest humanitarian crisis on Earth.** Half the country's people are on the brink of famine, the country has the world's worst cholera outbreak in modern history, and now Yemen has one of the very worst COVID death rates in the world: It kills 1 in 4 people it infects. The pandemic, along with withdrawal of aid, is pushing more people into acute hunger.

And yet Saudi Arabia is escalating its war and tightening its blockade.

The war is only possible because Western countries—and the United States and Britain in particular—continue to arm Saudi Arabia and provide military, political and logistical support for the war. The Western powers are active participants and have the power to stop the world's most acute human crisis. The disaster in Yemen is human-made. It is caused by the war and blockade. *It can be ended.*



People and organizations from the U.S., Britain, Canada, France, Italy, and across the world, are coming together to call for an end to the war in Yemen and solidarity with the people of Yemen. We demand that right now our governments:

- Stop foreign aggression on Yemen.
- Stop weapons and war support for Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates.
- Lift the blockade on Yemen and open all land and seaports.
- Restore and expand humanitarian aid for the people of Yemen.

We call on people around the world to protest the war on Monday, January 25, 2021, just days after the

U.S. presidential inauguration and make clear that the WORLD SAYS NO TO WAR ON YEMEN.

Election Returns Socialism to Bolivia

A year ago in Bolivia, a military coup backed by the US Embassy in La Paz forced the democratically-elected indigenous president, Evo Morales, out of office and into exile. President Trump immediately recognized the new far-right wing government led by Jeanine Anez, calling it a harbinger of things to come in Latin America.

If it is indeed a sign of things to come, the future just brightened a bit as Luis Arce, a member of Morales's socialist Mas Party, was elected to the presidency by a wide margin, defeating the conservative interim government of Jeanine Anez.

Arce had been the Finance Minister in the Morales government, and had been credited with lifting millions of Bolivians out of poverty by expanding the nation's economy and recognizing the rights of the indigenous people. The rightwing government had opposed these policies, but the vote shows that "the Bolivian people want to retake the path we were on," according to Arce.

On Nov. 9, Evo Morales returned to his native Bolivia by walking across the border from neighboring Argentina where he had been in exile this past year. He was greeted by brass bands and throngs of his fellow indigenous people.

So far, the US government has acknowledged the Arce victory and congratulated him. The will of the Bolivian people must be respected.
