Eliminates vote splitting

Ensures majority support
Discourages negative campaigning
Provides more choice for voters

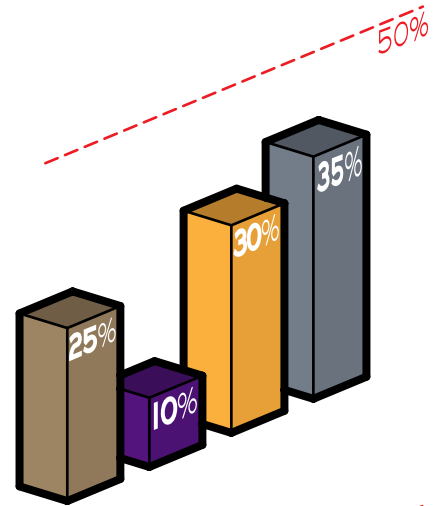

ROUND ONE

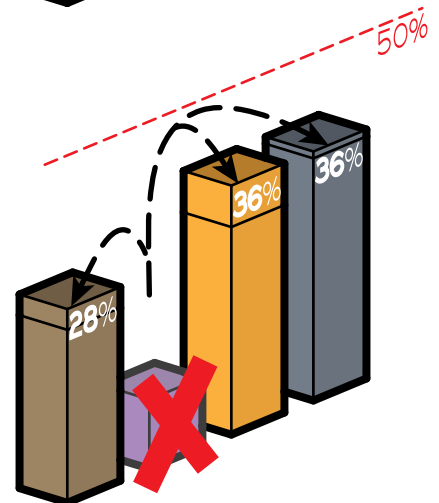
Mark your ballot by ranking the candidates in the order of your preference. In the first round, only your first choice vote will be counted. If no candidate gets more than 50% of the first choice votes, there will be a second round.

ROUND TWO

In the second round, the candidate with the least number of votes is eliminated. If your first choice candidate is eliminated, your vote will be reallocated to your next choice. Your vote will always count for your favourite candidate who is still in the running. If still no candidate has 50% support, there will be another round.

ROUND THREE

If there is a third round, the candidate with the least number of votes is eliminated once again, and votes are reallocated in the same way. At each round, your vote will only be reallocated if your preferred candidate has been eliminated. Every voter gets one vote. No more, no less. Counting continues until one candidate achieves more than 50% support, at which point a winner is declared.
