## President's message

Fellow RADC Members and Friends,

Season's Greetings to you and your family from our Democratic family!

In this time of COVID-19, we are all dealing with the Holiday Season differently than we ever have before. The pandemic has shown us a vulnerable social safety net system that has affected all of us. We have lost more than 290,000 of our fellow Americans to this pandemic. As we near the end of 2020 and look forward to a brighter 2021, I wanted to give you a snapshot of what we have done in 2020 with its highs and lows.

Locally, we were able to change leadership at the San Bernardino County Democratic Central Committee by electing our immediate past



president Kristin Washington as the new Chair. We re-elected Pete Aguilar, James Ramos, Eloise Reyes, and Eddie Tejada. We expanded voting rights to parolees. Our club delivered 130 Biden/Harris yard signs in the Inland Empire and we dropped off 300 door hangers in Loma Linda.

Unfortunately, we were not successful in races for Senate District 23, Congressional District 08 and Prop 15.

Nationally, we elected Joe Biden and Kamala Harris as our President and Vice President. Kamala broke the political glass ceiling as the first woman of Jamaican and Indian heritage.

Sadly, we lost our notorious trailblazer Ruth Bader Ginsburg. We witnessed Stacey Abrahams reaching more voters in Georgia than ever before, and personally, I'd like to see her get a national award for her work.

We held the fairest election in our country's history, despite Trump's legal suits.

In St. Louis, Cori Bush, a Black Lives Matter activist, registered nurse, pastor, and community leader, was elected to Congress. Bush is the first African American woman to serve in the U.S.

Congressman Aguilar was gracious enough to participate in the first ever Crisis Forum with the Redlands Chapter of Citizens Climate Lobby.

Since August, I have had the high honor of being your RADC President and could not have done it without our new and exciting Executive Board and you, the active members and backbone of this club. Additionally, Our membership has swelled to 116 members as of this writing.

Yes, a lot happened in 2020, but now is the time to embrace the new Biden/Harris administration and continue to move forward and fight the fight. As the late Rep. John Lewis taught us, let's keep getting into good trouble!

## Powering Forward: Black Lives Matter co-founder pushes back on Democrats' criticism of 'defund the police' ([Click here for Video](#)) 12/08/20 03:23 PM EST

Black Lives Matter co-founder and principal of the Black Futures Lab Alicia Garza rebuked Democrats' attacks on the push to "defund the police." Their dismissal of the slogan, she said, is an insult to activists who helped secure Joe Biden's victory.

Her comments come in the wake of a reckoning among House Democrats, who insist the movement's calls to "defund the police" contributed to down ballot losses that slimmed Democrats' majority in the House of Representatives. In a December 1 interview, former president Barack Obama criticized the slogan, calling it "snappy," arguing it could alienate those who take the phrase at face value.



"This movement, which really helped to push [Biden's] campaign over the finish line, was used as a political football all throughout this election cycle and that was true in 2016 as well," Garza said in an interview for POLITICO's Women Rule Capstone event. "There's a lot of valuable airspace that was used to be condescending to the very people who have opened the imagination of what this country can be -- and how we can get closer to the promise that this country has offered to so many."

Following a summer of protests against police violence and systemic racism,

activists with the Black Lives Matter Global Network and Movement for Black Lives organized several national campaigns to mobilize millions of Black voters. Their efforts bore fruit in Georgia, which flipped blue for the first time in 30 years, as well as in the key Blue Wall states of Michigan, Wisconsin and Pennsylvania, where historic turnout among Black voters helped pushed Biden and Kamala Harris over the top.

Garza said she wants Congress and the Biden-Harris administration to make policy changes addressing police brutality and police accountability. She endorsed The BREATHE Act, a four-part legislative proposal drafted by Black Lives Matter activists, which calls for divestment from law enforcement agencies and investment in communities of color.

She also emphasized the importance of diversity in the Biden/Harris administration. It's "more than unfortunate," Garza said, that women, people of color, the disabled and members of the LGBTQ community have been underrepresented in political spheres.

"It is their experiences that help us shape what the best solutions are," Garza said. "It's really a missed opportunity for this administration to not be looking at this in that way. And it's a missed opportunity to really mark a concrete shift from what we're coming out of with the Trump administration."


Garza, who as principal of the Black Futures Lab polls Black political behavior, said Democrats could do a better job of engaging their base -- overwhelmingly voters of color -- by addressing the issues they care about. Black Lives Matter, she said, "is not only changing conversations but it's changing laws."

# A Historic Day For Black Women, A Historic Day For The American Medical Association

## ESSENCE

**THE AMA AND ITS HOUSE OF DELEGATES OVERWHELMINGLY VOTED FOR THE FIRST TIME TO ADOPT POLICIES THAT NAME AND ACT ON RACISM AS A PUBLIC HEALTH THREAT.**

“If Black women are free, it would mean that everyone else would have to be free since our freedom would necessitate the destruction of all the systems of oppression.”

Betsey, Lucy, and Anarcha. The names of three enslaved women were memorialized on screen during the third episode of the first season of HBO’s *Lovecraft Country*. These names symbolize three women who were stripped further of any sense of human dignity during their time held captive and surgically experimented on without anesthesia for years by a prominent, white physician, J Marion Sims, to preserve one of the earliest engines of capitalism: the Black woman’s womb.

Dr. Sims has been considered the ‘father of gynecology’ — he invented the vaginal speculum still used today, and in 1875, he was elected President of the American Medical Association (AMA), the oldest, largest, and considered the most powerful organized body of medicine in the country. In reality, Sims’ presidency despite his gross use of power and disturbing legacy is not an isolated moment of racist norms within the AMA. This troubling history of medical experimentation is deeply connected to the health inequities Black women still experience to this day — a heartbreaking reminder of how systemic racism and health care have been intertwined for centuries.

In recent years, AMA has begun to reckon with not only its own racist past, but also the racist past of the larger field of medicine, in which it has been highly influential.

And this past Monday marked an historic day for the entire of community of medicine and the broader society at large: the American Medical Association and its House of Delegates for the first time in its history passed and adopted policy that sheds light on the harms and tragedies of racism for all of society and medicine to see. The 600+ delegates from across the nation voted overwhelming to adopt policies that name and act on racism as a threat to the public’s health, rid our healthcare system of racial essentialism, and support the elimination of race as a proxy for ancestry, genetics, and biology in medical education, research, and clinical practice.

It is racism, not race that produces higher death rates among Black women during childbirth, and of the babies that they bear.

Years of institutional and structural racism has produced the highest rates of heart disease and high blood pressure for Blacks. Racism has produced the highest rates of getting and dying from COVID-19. How powerful it is that one of this nation’s founding tenets is now a recognized threat to its existence and the existence of the most targeted and harmed by the

profession whose code of ethics demands that we “do no harm.” But we know that racism in medicine has created and perpetuated generations of harm.

While not exactly known, a confluence of events pushed the AMA to this critical juncture in history — the presidency of the first Black woman to be named AMA president, the leadership of the Black Lives Matter movement, resurgence of white supremacist action and terror, previous efforts of AMA’s Commission to End Health Disparities, recent AMA policy for the establishment of the AMA’s Center for Health Equity, the exposure of long-standing inequities by COVID-19, and the countless public murders of Black women and men at the hands of police, to name a few.

As a matter of time, most would say AMA's recent actions are long overdue. We cannot go back. However, we can and must now better understand the harms of racism and work to dismantle and redesign injustice out of our culture and systems.

A core strategy to ensure justice in our systems is centering the voices of those most marginalized. Many of our brave leaders of the reproductive justice movement have long said, "listen to Black women." Black women bring their minds and their hearts, as well as their lived experiences to justice work – it is personal in every way. The toll racism takes upon Black women, whether advocating inside or outside of organizations, is often underappreciated.

This Tuesday, as the deliberations of the AMA's House of Delegates ensued, Black women physicians shared their stories experiencing and witnessing discrimination and racism at the hands of medicine and of police. Their stories, along with other AMA voices of student and physicians, changed hearts and minds and moved the house of medicine toward a brighter day.

As Black women leading justice work – formally and in our everyday lives, exhaustion permeates our minds and hearts. Black women have fought in body and voice, in silence and with great stir. And the cost to our health has been great and unjust exemplified by the extraordinary lives of Betsey, Lucy, and Anarcha – our 'mothers of modern gynecology.'

The way forward for the AMA and other historically white institutions in our nation necessitates meaningful and deliberate action from many more accomplices, not only those of us most marginalized historically, operating in coalition and with great urgency.

Our collective freedom demands it.

***Editor's Note: Priya Vedula was a delegate to this convention. Here are her comments on this historical event:***

In early November, I attended my first AMA conference meeting as a delegate. We spent three days, and countless hours, discussing over 152 agenda items that involved the future of healthcare. I didn't realize it before, but our voices make such a big difference- the resolutions passed in the House of Delegates must be adopted and financially supported by the AMA. We passed resolutions that included criminal justice reform focused on healing and transformation instead of retribution, humane alternatives that focused on fostering immigrants rather than placing them in detention centers, environmental reforms to clean the air and water, and anti-racist policies that focus on the root of the problem.

After hours and hours of debate and advocacy, we finished our weekend. It's hard doing this work on Zoom because we can't quite experience the gravity and depth of what we accomplished as millennial and Generation Z students.

Days later, it finally made sense as I read the article by Dr. Maybank. She said, "this past Monday marked an historic day for the entire community of medicine and the broader society at large: the American Medical Association and House of Delegates for the first time in its history passed and adopted policy that sheds light on the harms and tragedies of racism for all of society and medicine to see..."

We did that.

I'm so honored and proud to say that I could be a part of the force that moved that needle, along with my fellow peers.

But the work is far from over and we can't go back now. Not now, not ever. We will continue the fight to ensure that every single person has access to a just healthcare system that has reckoned with its dark past and is ready for a brighter future.
