Dear President Rosenberg & Speaker DeLeo,

On Thursday, January 19th, the House Ways & Means Committee held a hearing on the recommendation of the Special Advisory Commission Regarding the Compensation of Public Officials. The attached chart is from that commission's report. Notable in this report is the recommendation to the Speaker of the House and the Senate President, which would see the salaries for their positions increase by over 70% each.

The U.S. average salary of the top 11 Senate Presidents is \$84,591. The recommendation of the commission is to pay the Massachusetts Senate President \$175,000. We find this recommendation, with such dramatic increases, to be indefensible. There is no evidence presented in the commission report that validates an increase in the Senate President's salary to be 108% more than the average of the top eleven salaries of other senate presidents. This recommendation should be rejected.

Similarly, the average salary of the top eleven salaries for the office of Speaker of the House is \$86,520. The recommendation of the commission is to pay the Speaker \$175,000. There is no evidence presented in the commission report that validates an increase in the Speaker's salary to be 102% more than the average of the top 11 salaries of Speakers of the House. We believe this recommendation is equally indefensible and should also be rejected.

At a time where revenues have not delivered against predictions and 9C cuts have been implemented, a proposal to increase the pay of legislative leadership would signal an attitude of indifference to the hard working families of the Commonwealth.

We would urge you to join us and reject the recommendations of the Special Advisory Commission Regarding the Compensation of Public Officials. Thank you for your attention on this matter.
