End of Life Choice





OVERWHELMING SUPPORT FOR Voluntary Assisted Dying LAWS IN regional SA

Regional voters are overwhelmingly supportive of voluntary assisted dying laws – and nowhere is that support stronger than in Dan van Holst Pellekaan's seat of Stuart and Stephan Knoll's seat of Schubert.

Across the state, up to 82 per cent of respondents to the 2019 ABC Vote Compass survey believe terminally ill patients should be able to end their own lives with medical assistance.

- Mount Gambier (Troy Bell, Independent. For): 77 per cent constituent support
- Giles (Eddie Hughes, Labor. For): 76 per cent constituent support
- Flinders (Peter Treloar, Liberal. For): 76 per cent constituent support

The Voluntary Assisted Dying Bill (2020), with 68 safeguards, is mirrored on the Victorian law which has now been in place for more than 18 months, providing reassurance, dignity and control for those with a terminal illness.

A similar law has also passed in Western Australia and Tasmania, meaning more than 10 million Australians will soon have access to voluntary assisted dying.

The SA Police has for the first time backed voluntary assisted dying legislation under strict circumstances.

Access to palliative care is essential too, but for 5 to 10 per cent of cases sadly it can't stop the intolerable pain and suffering. Where assisted dying legislation has been enacted, the palliative care sector has been strengthened because it generates discussions about end of life care as a whole.

VADSA was established in 1983 to campaign for legal voluntary assisted dying. The aim is to provide people who are suffering at the end of their life with the choice of a medically assisted death. VADSA works in the community and with Members of Parliament to achieve law reform.
