

Shopping List

Use our list or make your own list. (IDEA! Make your list from a favorite book that has food in it.) As you are shopping, have your children mark off the items as you see them or when you put them in your basket.

Variations:

Using the receipt or shopping list, while you put each item away at home ask your child to find the name of the item on the receipt or list and cross it out.

Lists aren't just used for grocery stores. Make lists for other places you go or things you do.

Department store, packing a suitcase, items in an office or other places, or objects in your house. You can make the game into a treasure hunt. Find all the items to get the treasure (reward) at the end.



Rhyming Game

There are many ways you can play this game. The following are just a couple of ideas.

Pick a word, any word that is easy to rhyme with. Take turns until you can't think of any more words. (This is great to do while you are driving.)

Make a list of the alphabet. Start with a common ending in a word such as: 'at', 'all', or 'ack'. Begin the game with one word that contains the ending you selected. Go down the list of letters from A to Z to make words that rhyme with the first word.

Example:

'at' Cat

At

Bat

Cat

D

E

Fat

G

Hat

I

J...

Wherever you are (in a store, on a bus, at the park, etc.) pick an object that is easy to rhyme with. Take turns coming up with words that rhyme.
