6. Endorsements of Candidates for Local Elected Office for the June 5, 2018 Election (Campos, F. Hsieh, Low)

Chair Campos clarified California Democratic Party policy on “No Endorsement” vote on numerous statewide candidate races that prohibited local county committees from a separate endorsement. Stated local rules that only allowed DCCC to endorse Democrats. Spoke about endorsement interviews from a couple of weekends ago where group heard from all eligible candidates. Videos of interviews available online. Chair acknowledged all mayoral candidates present, then spoke about party voting rules and procedures, including voting thresholds, effect of abstentions, vote options, and rank choice voting procedures. Member Low explained call and response procedure for voting. Member Alioto asked for clarification around procedure. Secretary F. Hsieh proceeded with vote.

See attachment for detailed vote count for following races:

a) Mayor - Round 1 voting for Mayor, rank 1 did not yield and endorsement, lowest vote getters (Alioto, Bravo, Weiss) were dropped and proceeded to round 2 voting for Mayor, rank 1. Member asked for clarification around changing her vote. Parliamentarian and Chair ruled that bylaws did not allow, “your vote is your vote.” Mark Leno secured majority. Voting proceeded to round 1 for Mayor, rank 2. Jane Kim secured majority. Voting proceeded to round 1 for Mayor, rank 3. Member Breed thanked supporters in room and on DCCC and withdrew name for consideration for Mayor, rank 3. Member Wiener asked for clarification on right of candidate to remove name from consideration. Chair Campos ruled that pursuant to request by Member Breed, her name would be removed from endorsement consideration for Mayor, rank 3,

leaving only Angela Alioto, Michelle Bravo, and Amy Farah Weiss and eligible candidates. "No Endorsement" secured majority. Member Alioto spoke about her history with the Democratic Party and frustration with DCCC as a body.

b) Board of Supervisors, District 8 - Chair Campos spoke about two candidates eligible for endorsement: Supervisor Jeff Sheehy and Member Rafael Mandelman. Following same procedure. Endorsement Committee Chair, Member Low conducted vote count for Supervisor District 8, rank 1. Rafael Mandelman secured a majority. Voting proceeded to Supervisor District 8, rank 2. Jeff Sheehy secured a majority. Without a qualified third candidate, voting on this race concluded.

c) Superior Court Judge, Seat 4 - Member F. Hsieh named eligible votes: Andrew Cheng, Phoenix Streets, No Endorsement, or Abstain. Andrew Cheng secured majority.

d) Superior Court Judge, Seat 7 - Chair Campos named eligible votes: Maria Evangelista, Curtis Karnow, No Endorsement, or Abstain. Curtis Karnow secured majority.

e) Superior Court Judge, Seat 9 - Member Low named eligible votes: Elizabeth Zareh, Cynthia Lee, Kwixuan Maloof, No Endorsement, or Abstain. Cynthia Lee secured majority.

f) Superior Court Judge, Seat 11 - Chair Campos named eligible votes: Jeffrey Ross, Nicole Solis, No Endorsement, or Abstain. Jeffrey Ross secured majority.

Proposed By-Law Amendments Regarding Use of San Francisco Democratic Party Name (Article 1, Section 1; Article 9, Section 1) and Conflict of Interest Disclosure (Article 4, Section 9)

(By-Laws) Article I, Section 1:

The name of this organization shall be the SAN FRANCISCO DEMOCRATIC PARTY. Its governing body shall be the SAN FRANCISCO DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CENTRAL COMMITTEE (SFDCCC). “The San Francisco Democratic Party is the sole owner of its name and logo. Publication of the San Francisco Democratic party’s name or logo in any written or spoken paid campaign advertising materials is permitted only with the prior written authorization of the San Francisco Democratic Party. Candidates and organizations interested in publicizing support of the San Francisco Democratic Party should contact the SFDCCC to receive a response in 10 business days. This section is not intended to prohibit individuals from communicating regarding their membership in the San Francisco Democratic Party or to prohibit a Chartered Democratic Club that has been granted authorization pursuant to Article IX, Section 1 from using “Democratic Party” within its name.”

(By-Laws) Article IX, Section 1:

“Only Chartered Democratic Clubs may seek written authorization to use the name of the Democratic Party within the City and County of San Francisco as part of their official organization name. This section shall not apply to organizations that are official parts of the California Democratic Party or the Democratic National Committee, or that have been authorized to use the name of the Democratic Party pursuant to the California Elections Code. Only the SFDCCC may represent itself as the San Francisco Democratic Party. No official Democratic Club, including their agents, third party and/or Independent Expenditure, may represent or utilize the SF Democratic Party name and/or logo on any endorsement or campaign material, including digital, communications that infringe on the SFDCCC trademark or that the communication has been approved by the SF Democratic Party such that a reasonable voter would be confused. And, the SFDCCC letterhead and stationery shall only be used for official SFDCCC business.”

(By-Laws) Article IV, Section 9:

Conflicts of Interest

Members ~~that have a Material Financial Interest determined to have a clear and direct economic self interest in a matter~~ before the SFDCCC shall disclose such Interest . Further Disclosure requirements and Definitions of conflicts of interest may be included in the Policy and Procedure Manual (see Article XIII, Sections 1-1.6). However, a member determined to have a clear and direct economic self interest, such as, a contract for goods and/or services directly with the SFDCCC shall neither comment on, nor vote on, said matter. The Chairperson or Acting Chair shall make determinations of whether a member has a conflict of interest. The Chair's ruling may be overturned by no less than a majority of those members present and voting.

Proposed Update to the Policy & Procedure Manual Regarding the Use of the San Francisco Democratic Party Name (Article 7, Sections 1.1-1.3) and Conflict of Interest Disclosure (new Article 14)

(PPM) Article VII, Section 1.1-1.3:

Use of SFDCCC Name and Logo

§ 1.1 In communication with voters only the SFDCCC and the San Francisco Democratic Party may utilize its name and logo including endorsements, except candidates and ballot initiatives may utilize the SFDCCC name and/or logo once they have received the endorsement of the body and obtained its written permission. It is strictly prohibited for any unendorsed candidate and/or ballot initiative, including any third party, Independent Expenditure or campaign to use or incorporate the name of the SFDCCC and/or logo for any purpose, or manner that contradicts, implies, suggests, mimics and/or misleads the public in any way regarding the SFDCCC's endorsements.

Campaign committees distributing communications regarding endorsed candidates are required to obtain advance written authorization from the SFDCCC to use the SFDCCC and the San Francisco Democratic Party name and/or logo in any campaign materials.

§ 1.2 The Spirit of this section is to ensure that voters are not confused or misled about the SFDCCC's endorsements. Each Candidate and ballot initiative shall sign a statement agreeing to abide by the policy laid out in Section 1.1. When the SFDCCC sends out an endorsement questionnaire, the policy regarding the use of the SFDCCC's name and logo shall be included with a signature request indicating that the candidate and/or ballot initiative will abide by this policy. This policy will specify the period for which the SFDCCC's name and logo may be used.

§1.3 Campaign committees and others seeking written permission to use the name and/or logo of the SFDCCC will be required to complete a form requesting permission. The completed form will be reviewed by the Executive Committee within 5 business days and can be approved by a majority vote of members of the Executive Committee. If the Executive Committee denies a request for use of the name/logo, such denial can be appealed to the members and overturned by a two-thirds vote of the membership at a special meeting to be called by the Chair, or by ten (10) voting members of the SFDCCC. Such special meeting is not subject to the notice requirements of Article IV Section 2 of the bylaws. The Chair shall send a copy of the materials along with a notice of the date, time, and location of the meeting to all members of the SFDCCC no less than seventy-two (72) hours prior to the scheduled meeting.

§ 1.4 If the Executive Committee determines that any candidate and/or ballot initiative, including any third party, "Independent Expenditure," and/or campaign committee's material is made which utilizes or incorporates the SFDCCC's name and/or logo for any purpose, including infringement on the trademark that the communication has been approved by the SF Democratic Party such that a reasonable voter would be confused, the following process will take place:

- a. The Chair of the SFDCCC shall schedule a hearing before the SFDCCC within 5 days of such determination. Such special meeting is not subject to the notice requirements of Article IV Section 2 of the bylaws. The chair shall send a copy of the materials and the Executive Committee's statement of charges to all members of the SFDCCC along with a notice of the date, time, and location of the hearing no less than seventy-two (72) hours prior to the scheduled hearing.
- b. At the hearing the members of the SFDCCC shall examine the statement of charges brought against the accused party, candidate and/or ballot initiative, including any third party, "Independent Expenditure," and/or campaign material. At the conclusion of said hearing, the Executive Committee may be directed to consult with legal counsel in order to assess a violation by a vote of not less than two-thirds (2/3) of the members present and voting. After receiving advice from counsel, the Executive Committee may take any and all reasonable and necessary steps to preserve the integrity of the SFDCCC's name and/or logo in the endorsement process.

(PPM) Article XIV, Sections 1.0-1.7

Conflict of Interest Disclosure

§1.0 Pursuant to Article IV, Section 9 of the SFDCCC By-Laws, the following shall apply to Conflicts of Interest:

§1.1 A Member of This Committee must disclose to other Members of This Committee, that said Member, the spouse of the Member, the domestic partner of the Member or a person in the Member's household, has a Material Financial Interest in advocating for or against a candidate or initiative.

§1.2 For purposes of this section, a "financial interest in advocating for or against a candidate or one or more initiatives" exists when the Member or the spouse/domestic partner of the Member or a person in the Member's household:

§1.7 For Members that do not file by October 1st, the Member's name shall be listed on a non-compliance list which will be posted on the SFDCCC website.

Resolution in Support of Fully Funding the University of California and California State University Systems

Sponsor: *Gallotta*

WHEREAS, Following decades of declining state investment, Governor Brown's proposed 2018-2019 budget does not adequately fund public higher education leading the University of California and the California State University systems to request \$140 million and \$171 million, respectively, to fund expanded course offerings, essential support services for students, and critical deferred maintenance needs; and

WHEREAS, Without this additional state funding, both the UC and CSU systems will be forced to increase tuition for all students in May 2018, making a UC and CSU education far less affordable and accessible to San Francisco students and families; and

WHEREAS, Each year hundreds of graduates from the San Francisco Unified School District and City College of San Francisco go on to pursue higher education at UC and CSU campuses and as the home of the University of California, San Francisco and San Francisco State University, the City and County of San Francisco has a direct stake in making sure that both institutions receive an adequate level of state support; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Democratic Party fully supports increasing state funding for the University of California by \$140 million in addition to the Governor's proposal, and supports increasing funding for the California State University by \$171 million above the Governor's proposal; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Democratic Party urges Assembly Budget Chair Phil Ting and San Francisco's state delegation to support fully funding the UC and CSU systems in the 2018-2019 budget.

Resolution Calling for the Implementation of a Municipal Bank in San Francisco

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that copies of this Resolution be sent to the Mayor of San Francisco, members of the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, San Francisco Office of the Treasurer and Tax Collector, San Francisco Office of the Controller, and Municipal Bank Feasibility Task Force.

Resolution on Charter Schools in San Francisco County

Sponsor: *Low, F. Hsieh*

WHEREAS, local public schools in San Francisco County are closing the opportunity gap and investing in students with the greatest needs by implementing evidence-based strategies, providing stable learning environments and employing highly skilled education professionals;

WHEREAS, charter schools with privately appointed boards do not represent the public but make decision about how public tax dollars are spent;

WHEREAS, the Democratic National Committee's 2016 Platform states that "Democrats oppose for-profit charter schools focused on making a profit off of public resources. We believe that high-quality public charter schools should provide options for parents but should not replace or destabilize traditional public schools. We support increased transparency and accountability for all charter schools.";
