Are you a registered member of the Democratic Party? Yes, I am a lifelong Democrat.

Please describe your contributions to the Democratic Party and/or increasing civic engagement in the democratic process at the local, state and or/national level in the most recent years.

As public leaders, I believe it is our responsibility to ensure our government is open, inclusive and protects and provides opportunities for all our residents. As a daughter of immigrants, I have seen, first-hand, the challenges and barriers many face when it comes to civic participation. Throughout my public service and before becoming an elected official, I have worked to encourage voter participation, especially within our immigrant communities. In my current role, I prioritize language access to encourage San Franciscans to access our City services and was amongst the first departments in the City to require office-wide implicit bias training so that we can better serve our constituents. Recently I have engaged with OCEIA and non-profit organizations to encourage traditionally undercounted communities to participate in the upcoming 2020 Census because it matters for representation and for funding. And, I am proud to have initiated the W Challenge, an effort to encourage women's voter participation. The goal of the W Challenge is to channel women's authentic voices to show that women, across interests and the political spectrum, are united with it comes to pushing for voter participation. Are there any other civic causes or organizations that you are involved with? Please describe. In addition to the civic causes mentioned above, I am very involved with volunteering at and supporting non-profit community organizations across the City. I volunteer at foodbanks, at senior meal programs, at neighborhood clean-up days and beautification events and enjoy working hand-in-hand with community volunteers to strengthen our neighborhoods. Currently I chair standards for the California Assessors' Association, a statewide non-profit professional organization for the 58 elected county Assessors. Previously I served as the President of the Bay Area Assessors Association. I am also involved with the San Francisco Bay Area Planning and Urban Research Association and the SF Employee Retirement System.

In my first term as Assessor, I've also focused on providing effective and ethical leadership for San Francisco in an area that is critical for our City's success - the strengthening of our financial - to deliver nearly \$3 billion in annual revenue for vital city services including public education, housing, public safety, senior services, and street cleaning.

Yes, I believe we need to create a fairer property tax system that allows for commercial properties to be reassessed with changes in ownership and also believe proposers should work with State Assessors to ensure specific proposals can be implemented and Assessors have the tools and resources they need to implement changes.
- Would you support overturning Costa Hawkins to support the right for localities to pass rent
 control laws? I support prevention of predatory rental pricing/practices and am concerned
 with impact on future housing development and current single family home/condo owners.
- Do you support the repeal of the Ellis Act? I believe abuse of the Ellis Act should to be addressed and that property owners should also have the ability to live in the property they purchase.

Short-Answer (250 words or less)

If you are elected, what are your top priorities? How do you intend on addressing these?

As Assessor, one of the most important roles I play is in the ethical and effective financial stewardship of San Francisco. Property taxes is the largest funding source for general local services and funds

California's public education programs. If I am re-elected, my focus will be on ensuring our administration of property taxes is strong and fair, modernizing and leading the transition of our City's outdated property tax system to a platform that supports transparency and that reduces revenue at risk, implementing process improvements that removes barriers to building more housing especially on public-private partnerships, and ensuring our direct services reach the community.

Already we are well on our way towards modernizing the City's property tax platform. Over the last year, my office, along with the Controller and Tax Collector have been working side-by-side to ensure that the replacement of our financial systems are in sync and aligned. We've completed the development of requirements, mapping to-be business processes, issued and completed the RFP process and are getting ahead of future data conversion challenges by beginning work to clean and standardize our information now.

This year we are also on track to reverse a decades old backlog! This is a significant accomplishment given our backlog history and the results of our production goals has meant that San Francisco realizes revenues from reassessments quicker and taxpayers have more certainty around tax obligations faster. Over the past year we've also been working with Public Works and our City agency partners to streamline our collective workflows. By creating clear processes for parcel management/subdivisions and assessments we can help speed up the development of housing especially for large public-private projects. In addition, there are close to 30 additional active small and large initiatives that we are pursuing to deliver more accountability in our operations.

What do you believe should be the budget priorities for California? How will you ensure policies are equitable to protect low-income and middle-income communities?

According to the SacBee, California is now the world's fifth-largest economy with gross state product of \$2.747 trillion in 2017. In general, I would like to see California invest more in public education (including higher education), in sustainable infrastructure to help California continue to have a leading edge in our economy and in healthcare. California's per pupil spending is amongst the lowest and investments in higher education has not kept pace with the population. The result is poorer educational outcomes for our students and a higher education system that is increasingly hard to access. I believe strongly in the power of education to uplift communities, especially low and middleincome communities and would like to see California invest more in our public education. On healthcare, our current system of providing healthcare is fragmented and provides little transparency in terms of health outcomes and costs. Meanwhile families and local governments are shouldering the cost of rising health care costs. I would like to see California lead the way when it comes to delivering a framework for transparent affordable care. Finally, on a sustainable infrastructure that helps California continue to succeed... California needs to be a leader when it comes to addressing the realities of climate change and a growing population head on. Investments in sustainable mass transportation, water reclamation and conservation, housing is part of the need when planning for California's growth. Part of this priority is also recognizing how our economy is changing and being proactive to address needs of the new economy with our current and future workforce. Addressing education, healthcare and being forward thinking on the investments in human capital and physical infrastructure needed to sustain the economy and population of the future will go a long way towards promoting positive outcomes low and middle-income communities.

I am a lifelong Democrat and have supported policies consistent with Democratic party values around inclusion, opportunity and investments in public infrastructure, education and health care. This includes access to education and employment opportunities and access to health care and housing.
