WHAT'S THE PROBLEM?

HOUSING

Nearly half of households in our city are renters.




The City of Toronto committed to build 10,000 affordable housing units by 2019. But less than half will be built by then — and most won't be truly affordable for low-income residents.

JOBS

Many Toronto workers struggle with short-term, temporary jobs, low wages, and no benefits. Women, youth, and members of racialized groups are especially affected.

Fares keep increasing, but not enough public money is being invested in services. Between 2009 and 2018, the cost of the monthly Metropass went up by \$37.25, to \$146.25.

CHILD CARE

It costs more than \$20,000 a year to place an infant in a licensed child care centre in Toronto.

Only 1 in 5 children under age 13 have access to licensed child care. Almost all child care centres in Toronto have waiting lists.

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HOW CAN CITY COUNCIL MAKE A DIFFERENCE?

The City of Toronto can reduce poverty by fully implementing TO Prosperity (Toronto's Poverty Reduction Strategy), and by committing to:

- Build 7,200 new supportive housing units, at least 4,000 new deeply affordable rental housing units, and 1,000 new shelter spaces during the next four years.
- Reduce TTC fares for an additional 157,000 lower-income adults.
- Ensure that new real estate developments provide good, living wage jobs for local communities, including youth, through community benefits agreements with developers.
- Create 11,500 new child care spaces, including 5,000 subsidized spaces.

- Do you support the full funding and implementation of Toronto's Poverty Reduction Strategy?
- What is your plan for creating more good jobs in Toronto?
- How will you help families and individuals secure and maintain safe, decent, and affordable housing?
- How and when will you make TTC fares affordable for everyone, especially low-income people?
- How will you help all families access affordable, licensed child care in their neighbourhoods?
