AFFIDAVIT

I, Sarah Webb, of the Cities of Victoria and Calgary, Hotel Manager in the Provinces of British Columbia and Alberta respectively, SWEAR THAT:

1. I am a Petitioner in support of the Petition to the Court in the Supreme Court of British Columbia (“**SCBC**”) filed with this Affidavit (the “**Petition**”). I am a hotel manager, residing in both Alberta and British Columbia (“**BC**”) and I have personal knowledge of the facts sworn to in this Affidavit, except where stated to be based on information, in which case I believe that information to be true.
2. The Petition is a judicial review application and *Charter* challenge of the Order Announced by Dr. Bonnie Henry (the “**Provincial Health Officer**”) and Adrian Dix, BC’s Minister of Health (“**MoH**”) on August 23, 2021 (the “**Vaccine Card Order**”) under the *Public Health Act*, SBC 2008, c 28 (the “**Public Health Act**”). I adopt the defined terms in Petition for the purposes of my Affidavit.

Background

3. I am 39 years old and currently live and work in Victoria, BC and Calgary, Alberta spending roughly 50% of my time in each province respectively.
4. I have two children ages 6 and 10.

5. I have maintained a healthy and active lifestyle my whole life and, to my knowledge, I have no underlying health conditions.
6. I have a post graduate degree in business from Oxford Brooks University in 2006. I currently work full-time in hotel management in Victoria, BC and Calgary Alberta and work normal business hours during my working days.

Vaccination History

7. I have not now, nor have I ever, been against the concept or general importance of receiving vaccinations.
8. To date, I have received each of the standard vaccinations, as required and prescribed under the Canadian Immunization Guide (“**CIG**”) and even some additional vaccinations as I have traveled extensively over my lifetime. Attached as **Exhibit “A”** is a copy of my vaccination record to date.

My Covid-19 Vaccination

9. In or around the end of April of 2021, I became eligible to receive my Covid-19 vaccination (the “**Vaccination**”). On or around this date, I immediately took steps to book my Vaccination in accordance with the prescribed guidelines in Alberta and British Columbia at that time.
10. On Sunday May 2, 2021, I received my first Covid-19 vaccination shot (my “**Vaccination Appointment**”). At my Vaccination Appointment, I was given the vaccine produced by ModernaTX, Inc. and colloquially known as the Moderna vaccine (“**Moderna**”) as that was the vaccine available at the time of my appointment (the “**Covid-19 Vaccine**”).
11. I was not notified that I would be receiving Moderna until moments before receiving the Covid-19 Vaccine. At the time of my receipt of the Covid-19 Vaccine, I was not given the appropriate information as to:
 - (a) The possible side-effects of the Covid-19 Vaccine (“**Side-Effects**”);
 - (b) The likelihood of experiencing Side-Effects of the Covid-19 Vaccine;
 - (c) The duration of any long-term Side-Effects of the Covid-19 Vaccine; or
 - (d) Any benefits or drawbacks to the Moderna vaccine over other available vaccines.

My Body’s Response to the Covid-19 Vaccine

12. On Saturday May 8, 2021, my armpit lymph node began to swell. By 6:00pm that evening, a rock-hard lump appeared on my left shoulder where I had received my Covid-19

Vaccine. The area became red and hot to the touch which was accompanied by a sharp pain and difficulty raising my arm.

13. Given these symptoms, that evening, I attended the Emergency Department of the Rockyview General Hospital located at 7007 14 St SW, Calgary, AB T2V 1P9, (the "**Rockyview Hospital Emergency**"). An ultrasound of my arm showed large amounts of fluid under the lump that had formed, and I was advised that my body was responding to an infection from the Covid-19 Vaccine. Thereafter, I was proscribed antibiotics and discharged.
14. The following day, Sunday May 9, 2021, I awoke with a red rash that began to form on my left arm, the arm in which I had received the Covid-19 Vaccine (the "**Rash**"). The Rash remained hot to the touch and began to grow becoming increasingly painful as it did so. To track the progression of the Rash, I began to take photographs of the Rash at various intervals throughout the day marking the progression of the Rash with a black marker. Attached as **Exhibit "B"** is a copy of those pictures.
15. That evening I attended the Emergency Department of the Foothills Medical Centre located at 1403 29 St NW, Calgary, AB T2N 2T9 (the "**Foothills Hospital Emergency**"). I was again advised by a second physician that this reaction was likely an infection and a further response that my body was experiencing as an adverse reaction to the Covid-19 Vaccine. At that time, I was expressly advised by the presiding emergency physician that, given this adverse reaction to the Covid-19 Vaccine, I should not receive the second vaccination shot advised by the CIG and National Advisory Committee on Immunization ("**NACI**").
16. By Monday May 10, 2021 the Rash had largely resolved but by May 15, 2021, it had once again returned. On May 15, 2021, the Rash covered my left arm with small hives forming inside of the rash and my tongue began to swell. I took further pictures to capture these symptoms and contacted my family physician to schedule an appointment. Attached as **Exhibit "C"** is a copy of the additional pictures I took on May 15, 2021, and provided to my family physician.
17. When I continued to experience symptoms starting in June of 2021 I was advised by family physician, that I should consider keeping a log-book of each symptom that appeared to be related to my body's response to the Covid-19 Vaccine (the "**Logbook**"). Attached as **Exhibit "D"** is a copy of the Logbook.
18. The Logbook outlines that, since receiving the Covid-19 Vaccine, I have on average, between 2-4 times per week, experienced, among other things:
 - (a) Short and long lethargic bouts in which I am exhausted and unable to participate in or continue daily activities;

- (b) The feeling that the arm in which I received the Covid-19 Vaccine is swelling as though a viscous fluid, like cement, is slowly filling my arms and bones;
 - (c) Intermittent Tachycardia and other heart arrhythmias without justification or provocation that I have experienced while resting; and
 - (d) Cramping like those experienced during my monthly menstrual cycle.
19. I have been advised by family physician and do believe that these symptoms are directly related to my receipt of the Covid-19 Vaccine in May of 2021.
 20. On September 3, 2021, my family physician provided me with a formal note from advising that, as a result of my severe and adverse reaction to the Covid-19 Vaccine, I have been expressly advised to avoid further doses of the Covid-19 Vaccine (the “**Doctor’s Note**”). Attached as **Exhibit “E”** is a copy of the Doctor’s Note.
 21. My family physician further advised me that the government and provincial medical associations have not provided any guidelines or information as to how to properly write an exemption letter in these circumstances, or what information should be included in such a letter.
 22. My family physician further advised me that, as more details come to light in this regard, she will provide me with a more detailed Doctor’s Note once the government and medical associations provide more clarity in this regard.

The BC Vaccination Requirement

23. On Monday, August 23, 2021, BC Premier John Horgan (“**Premier Horgan**”) alongside Dr. Bonnie Henry, BC’s Provincial Health Officer (“**Dr. Henry**”), and Adrian Dix, BC’s Minister of Health (“**MoH**”) announced that, starting September 13, 2021, a proof of vaccination will be required in British Columbia for all people attending certain social and recreational settings and events (the “**Vaccine Card Announcement**”). Attached as Exhibit “F” is a copy of the Vaccine Card Announcement as pulled from the BC Gov News Website: <https://news.gov.bc.ca/releases/2021HLTH0053-001659>
24. My Review of the Vaccine Card Announcement shows that the BC government intends to require all people in BC to be vaccinated in order to access certain businesses and events including, without limitation, restaurants, indoor theatre/dance/symphony events, and fitness centres/gyms, and organized indoor events (including, conferences, meetings, and workshops) (collectively, the “**Vaccine Restrictions**”).
25. I regularly live and work in BC and engage in the businesses and events that are incorporated within the Vaccine Restrictions as part of my job, and also in my off hours. Should the Vaccine Restrictions be enforced as enumerated in the Vaccine Card Announcement I will not be able to continue to participate in the social and economic life of BC with my family or community.

26. During my time in BC I have followed recommended physical distancing, hand washing, and mask wearing procedures where necessary. I have never tested positive for COVID-19 and have attempted, at all times, to be responsible in reducing the spread of Covid-19.







B.C. launches proof of vaccination to stop spread of COVID-19

Starting Sept. 13, 2021, proof of vaccination will be required in B.C. for people attending certain social and recreational settings and events.

This important step will continue to increase the vaccination rate across the province and provide confidence to fully vaccinated people that those around them are also fully vaccinated.

“Vaccines are our ticket to putting this pandemic behind us,” said Premier John Horgan. “So I call on all eligible unvaccinated British Columbians to roll up their sleeves to stop the spread, and help protect themselves, their loved ones and the people in their community. British Columbia has one of the strongest vaccination rates in Canada with 75% of eligible people now fully vaccinated, but there is still more work to do.”

A new order from the provincial health officer will require individuals to provide proof of vaccination to access a broad range of social, recreational, and discretionary events and businesses throughout the province. As of Sept. 13, one dose of vaccine will be required for entry to these settings. By Oct. 24, entry to these settings will require people to be fully vaccinated at least seven days after receiving both doses. To enter certain spaces, including indoor ticketed sporting events, indoor and patio dining in restaurants, fitness centres, casinos and indoor organized events, like conferences and weddings, people aged 12 and older will be required to show their proof of vaccination.

“I am grateful to every single person who has taken the time to receive their COVID-19 vaccine,” said Dr. Bonnie Henry, B.C.’s provincial health officer. “While our vaccination rate continues to rise, we are still seeing waves of transmission primarily amongst those who are not fully vaccinated. These new measures will help reduce transmission and keep our communities safe and ensure we can continue to keep businesses open and safely enjoy much-needed social events.”

A secure weblink will be provided and publicized before Sept. 13, where people will be able to confidentially access their proof of vaccination. Individuals will be able to save a copy of their proof of vaccination to their phone to show it when entering or using designated businesses and events. Individuals who cannot access their proof of vaccination online will be provided with a secure alternative option.

“Getting vaccinated keeps everyone in B.C. safe and stops the spread of COVID-19,” said Adrian Dix, Minister of Health. “And getting vaccinated is the best choice to protect yourself, the people you love and to ensure you can continue to participate in these public and private events and settings. Our B.C. vaccine card is an essential interim action until we transition to a federally compliant proof of vaccine.”

By getting vaccinated prior to Sept. 13, every British Columbian can continue to access these events and settings.

Details on specific COVID-19 safety requirements for K-12 and post-secondary schools will be available this week.

Backgrounders

How it works

- As of Sept. 13, people in British Columbia will be required to be partially vaccinated with at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine to access certain businesses and events.
- As of Oct. 24, people in British Columbia will be required to be fully immunized, at least seven days after receiving two doses of COVID-19 vaccine, to access the same list of businesses and events.
- In the interim, in areas where community transmission is increased significantly or where there are outbreaks, the requirements to be fully vaccinated to access these events and activities may be required at the direction of the local medical health officer.
- Here is the full list of settings where proof of vaccination will be required:
 - indoor ticketed sporting events
 - indoor concerts
 - indoor theatre/dance/symphony events
 - restaurants (indoor and patio dining)
 - night clubs
 - casinos
 - movie theatres
 - fitness centres/gyms (excluding youth recreational sport)
 - businesses offering indoor high-intensity group exercise activities
 - organized indoor events (eg. weddings, parties, conferences, meetings, workshops)
 - discretionary organized indoor group recreational classes and activities
- Individual businesses or event organizers may also implement these requirements earlier as part of their ongoing safety plans. Businesses or institutions choosing to adopt their own vaccination policies beyond those set out in this order will be responsible for doing their own due diligence.
- Individuals will be able to confidentially access their proof of vaccination through a secure website. A weblink will be provided and publicized widely before Sept. 13. To access proof of vaccination an individual will need:
 - name
 - date of birth
 - personal health number (PHN)
- Individuals will be able to save a copy of their proof of vaccination to their phone to show when entering or using designated businesses and events.

- A second, secure option will be provided for people who cannot access their proof of vaccination online through a call-in centre (call centre details to be made public in coming days).
- Individuals will show proof of vaccination in the settings listed in the PHO order, alongside valid government ID.
- Proof of vaccination will also be required for people visiting from outside of B.C. using a provincially/territorially recognized official record alongside valid government ID from the jurisdiction. For individuals visiting from outside of Canada, they will be required to show their proof of vaccination used to enter the country and their passport.
- The measures will be time limited through to Jan. 31, 2022, subject to possible extension.
- The measures set out above do not apply to K-12 schools (public and independent) and before-and-after school programs for students. Student-only events and activities within K-to-12 public and independent schools and before and after school programs are excluded from providing a proof of vaccine as they will be covered by specific guidelines for school and child care settings. Guidance for these settings related to students will be provided in the coming days. The measures do apply to large indoor events (theatre, concerts) attended by parents, family and/or the public.
- The measures set out above will, as relevant, apply to post-secondary campuses. Student housing will be a part of the public health order identifying where proof of vaccination is required and will be in effect for Sept. 7. Further guidance for these settings related to students will be developed in the coming days in consultation with public health, including which types of student housing facilities will be included.

How to get vaccinated and stay safe from COVID-19

To get the most effective protection against serious cases of COVID-19, you need two doses of vaccine. If you haven't been vaccinated yet, or it's time for your second dose (at least 28 days since your first dose), book or visit a drop-in clinic and get protected from COVID-19.
