For the resources, we have used the bibliographic format from the *Chicago Manual of Style* (Chicago University Press, 2003). You will need to choose a system of referencing that works for you. Whatever system you use, make sure that you use it consistently.

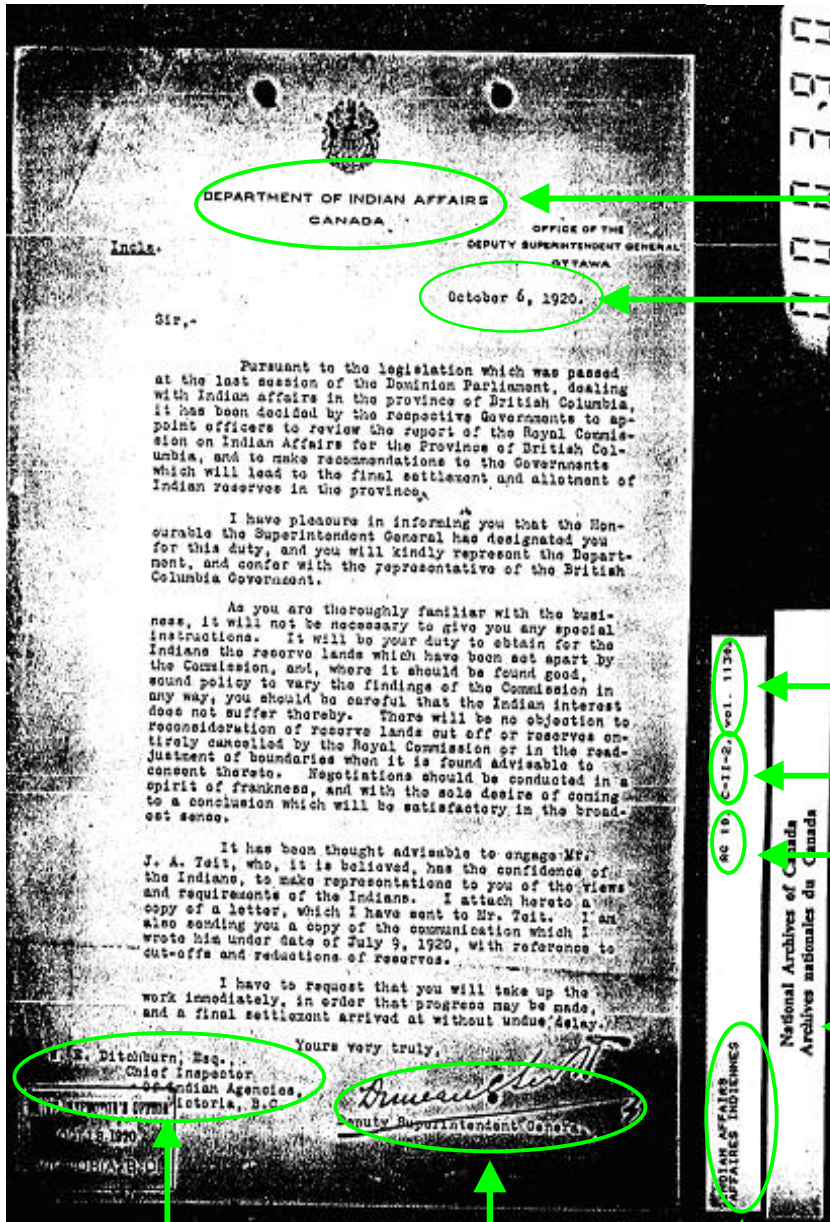
