

# COVID-19 Emergency Measures Uptake

## Temporary Housing Agreements and Temporary Support Agreements (THSA)

A total of **506** young adults benefited from the THSA emergency measures at some point between March 17 and December 31, 2020:

- **119** youth who turned 19 had funding provided to support to stay in their placement.
- **342** young adults on ILAs/YAGs continued to receive support after they turned 19.
- Another **59** young adults received COVID funding where the program could not be confirmed.
- Some young adults were supported by more than one program over the reporting period.

## Agreements with Young Adults (AYA)

A total of **1,137** young adults were actively enrolled in the AYA program\* between March 17 and December 31, 2020, of which

- **1,009** young adults continued to receive their regular support through the AYA program.
- **95** were signed up under the AYA regulation change. \*\*
- **32** were signed up under the life-skills policy amendments. \*\*\*
- **6** young adults were identified with a COMBO AYA agreement

### **Notes:**

These numbers may change retroactively as more data gets entered in ICM.

There can be overlap between the THSA and AYA categories over the reporting period, as such, the two categories cannot be summed.
