#### DIRECTOR'S LETTER

Many years ago, my son lost his mother to breast cancer at a very young age. With the support of the Primary Intervention Program at the Elementary School, he was able to find a sense of refuge during this period of grief, and for that I am forever grateful. This program was supported by our local United Way. After observing our chapter's positive impact in the San Juan Islands Communities and experiencing the support and camaraderie first hand, I chose to get involved. United Way continuously meets critical needs for vulnerable families and individuals throughout the islands.

At United Way, we support families and individuals within the community, with funded programs promoting health, human services, education, senior services, and income stability needs. As I watched my sons battle grief and grow into young men, I often thought about the potential outcomes if our family didn't have access to the Primary Intervention Program. I'm not sure how we would have persisted. Often, I have remarked to them that adverse life situations can happen to any of us and we have a duty to give back since we have been so blessed.

Imagine the impact you can have with your donation. This might be to help a child struggling in school with the after school reading enrichment program, a cold weather shelter for the homeless, a school food program for children who are hungry, or an elder needing help with transportation to services to remain independent in their home. 

### YOUTH AND FAMILIES SERVED BY 11 PROGRAMS WITH TOTAL CONTRIBUTIONS OF \$106,190.53










#### LOPEZ CHILDREN'S CENTER

Julian has been attending Lopez Children's Center since the day he turned two. His parents live in two households and have faced many of the challenges of Island families; affordable finding housing. consistent employment and meeting all their family needs while supporting two homes. Julian has been able to attend the Lopez Children's Center PAL and now Preschool programs consistently throughout the last two years.

Through support from United Way and the Lopez Community, his parents have been offered scholarships to help them through months with low or no employment, enabling Julian to stay in class and continue his learning.



This consistency has not only been life changing for Julian, but also for his parents; knowing that their son is welcomed into a high quality early learning environment enables them to focus on doing what they need to build a stable home life. This is an ongoing situation for their family and Lopez Children Center will be here supporting them all, so that he will be ready to move on to kindergarten next September.



Finding a way to pay for these classes became a problem. I had already attended college so it was hard to find funding to get my CDA, lifeguard certification, and forest school teacher certification.

Paying for the classes and the time away from work would have made attending these classes impossible on my budget. Having the help from ECEI gave me the ability to attend my training, allowed me to be lead teacher at the first licensed forest preschool in the country.


#### A LETTER TO THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR


Cheers to the 'RoundTowner Team!

Out here in the small town of Friday Harbor, in this insular community of the San Juan Islands, we are not blessed with the big-city, year-round metro bus system to take us where we need to go. Those of us who are old and/or disabled are past hitch hiking or hiking of any kind. Although I live a hop, skip and a jump from the grocery store, doctors restaurants and shops, my medical conditions make walking any distance a risky affair.

That's when the 'RoundTowner comes heroically to the rescue of the many elder residents of our community who have trouble getting around.





We, who live out here on an island, are an independent lot. Those of us who are elderly or disabled want to take care of ourselves with dignity, not always begging for rides from family and friends.
