EU jobs associated with trade with the UK

You asked for an update of figures previously produced by the Library showing the number of EU jobs associated with exports to the EU. These were included in an earlier version of the Library's note, In brief: UK-EU economic relations.

Estimates of the number of jobs associated with trade with particular partners are highly controversial both in the method used to calculate them and in terms of how they should be interpreted.

It is important to be aware that there are methodological issues with the estimates in the table below. They should therefore be used with caution. The estimate of 3.5 million jobs in the UK associated with exports to the EU quoted in answers to Parliamentary Questions is based on the amount of UK *value added* in UK exports. This methodology has been described by the BBC as "a bit suspect." The methodology used in the table below is less good than that used to produce the 3.5 million figure. The trade figures used are compiled on a gross basis rather than a value added basis. This means they do not take account of any imported goods used to produce the exports. The implication of this is that the estimates in the table are likely to overestimate the number of jobs associated with exports to the EU. This may well be why the estimate for UK jobs associated with trade with the EU in the table (3.9 million) is higher than the 3.5 million referred to in PQ answers.

Second, at best these figures can be described as EU jobs associated with exports to the UK. This is not the same as the number of jobs which would be lost if the UK left the EU as some level of trade would continue to take place between the EU and the UK in the event of Brexit.

Subject to the caveats above, these very rough estimates show that there were around 5.5 million jobs in the EU associated with exports to the UK in 2014. This is 3.1% of employment in the 27 other members of the EU. Using the same methodology for the UK gives a figure of 3.9 million UK jobs associated with exports to the EU. This is a much higher percentage of UK employment (12.6%).

There is considerable variation in the importance of the UK as an export market between the other EU member states. Exports to the UK were equivalent to 11% of GDP in Ireland but only 1.2% in Croatia. Besides Ireland, exports to the UK were over 5% of GDP in five other countries: Belgium, Cyprus, Luxembourg, Malta and the Netherlands. Exports to the UK were below 2% of GDP in eight countries (Austria, Bulgaria, Croatia, Estonia, Finland, Italy, Romania and Slovenia).

Compared to the figures for 2011, the number of EU jobs associated with exports to the UK has increased from 5.0 million to 5.5 million. This is because EU exports to the UK have increased by 10% in cash terms over this period. By contrast, the number of UK jobs associated with exports to the EU has fallen from 4.5 million to 3.9 million as UK exports to the EU have fallen by 5% in cash terms between 2011 and 2014.
