Off and Running: serving the Wilderness community

Responding to a critical need – to care for America's 110 million-acre wilderness resource – NWSA launched in 2010 and has much to report. A national conference of 125 attendees in March 2011 underscored both the needs of wilderness and the power of what NWSA has to offer: a nationwide forum where volunteers can interact with each other and federal agency staff to enhance wilderness stewardship.

NWSA connects its members with each other and the broader wilderness community through its website -- www.wildernessalliance.org -- a toolkit, resource experts, and an interactive map listing information on local stewardship organizations. NWSA's agenda includes increasing support to fledgling and established wilderness groups alike.

NWSA made great strides in its first year to build a solid foundation, establishing bylaws and a Board of Directors, gaining 501(c)(3) status, launching a successful membership and fundraising campaign, and solidifying partnerships with all four federal wilderness agencies.

Looking ahead, NWSA's mission will ensure an enduring resource of wilderness which can fulfill its crucial ecological role as well as do what it does best: renew the human spirit.
