Managing Director's Report



I have thoroughly enjoyed my first year as Managing Director at Youth Action. During this time, the team has welcomed some fresh faces, celebrated the amazing work of those who went before us, and supported the phenomenal work of 32 young people through our internship program.

We kicked off the year by launching our NSW Election Agenda — shaping our advocacy efforts around nine key areas affecting young people throughout NSW. We had three significant wins in the areas of youth mental health, domestic and family violence and supportive schools, and I will make sure we push for change in the remaining six areas of policy.

Our incredible membership base of youth services and young people engaged with us throughout the year during the Election Agenda Campaign, Youth Sector Development initiatives, our annual Youth Work Awards, *Shift This* Youth Conference, and annual members surveys, just to name a few. I was happy to see a 367% increase in young people who responded to our annual membership survey, as we have been working hard to develop more avenues for young people to shape the focus of Youth Action's work.

Our media coverage soared, with a huge 124 mentions of Youth Action. This coverage was not only reflective of our policy work, but of the innovation coming out of the youth sector and young people. Over the coming year we will continue to push the positive contribution of the sector through our media profile.

I want to thank the youth sector, the amazing young people we work with, my team who are always pushing for positive outcomes for young people, and our exceptional Board of Governance.

I am excited for a year ahead of innovation and strong advocacy for young people and the incredible youth services who support them.

INTERNS

This year we worked with 32 young people through our internship and student placement programs. Our interns worked alongside Youth Action staff and gained valuable policy and advocacy work experience.

Membership

Youth Action's membership represents the collective voice of the NSW youth sector and young people. Our members range from small independent services and local councils, to local and national NGOs. In 2014/2015:

- We welcomed 14 new member organisations.
- Due to sector reforms and funding constraints 5 previous member organisations closed down.



Youth Sector Support and Development

This year, our sector support work was informed by the announcement of reforms to the two major funding streams for NSW youth services – the Early Intervention and Placement Prevention and Community Builders programs.

TARGETED EARLIER INTERVENTION (TEI) REFORMS

Youth Action focussed our resources in planning, researching and lobbying with Ministers and bureaucrats to ensure that the sector was involved in the reform process.

We established a group of experienced youth workers, the Practice Expert's Group, who provide Youth Action and the sector with rapid responses to changes proposed under reforms.

At the time of writing, the TEI reforms process is underway and we are continuing our advocacy for the sector.

RESULTS-BASED ACCOUNTABILITY PILOTS

Youth Action and NSW Family Services (FamS) coordinated two results-based accountability pilot programs to assist the sector in better articulating their successes and achievements.

Ten child, youth and family services in the Nepean/ Blue Mountains District and the Adolescent and Family Counsellors Association developed two service-led outcomes frameworks from these pilots.

DISTRICT REPRESENTATIVES PROGRAM

We established district representatives to provide Youth Action with a localised voice, and to support both local sector leadership and information flow across NSW.

The District Representatives program kicked off in June 2015 with representatives from 10 metro, rural and regional districts meeting in Sydney.

WESTERN SYDNEY

In 2015, the Western Sydney Youth Sector Alliance known as 'SHOUT' was officially re-established as the Western Sydney Youth Sector Network (WSYSN).

The Western Sydney Project delivered and supported the following Sector Support & Development initiatives:

SURVIVAL TRAINING

Survival Training provides youth workers with the tools and knowledge they need to thrive in their work with young people. Our two-day course covers a range of topics including: engaging with young people, youth mental health, drug and alcohol issues, managing challenging behaviours and duty of care and ethics. In 2014/2015 Survival training was held in Wollongong, Sydney, Orange, Ingleside and Parramatta.

Engaging Young People

This year, Youth Action began pivotal changes in how we engage with young people. As we re-evaluated our youth publication Unleash, we also pushed forward with new ways of reaching young people both online and offline.

SHIFT THIS 2014 YOUTH CONFERENCE

Shift This is Youth Action's biennial youth conference that enables young people to develop skills to make positive changes in their communities.

By the conclusion of the conference 11 projects were developed, addressing issues such as ethical consumerism, youth unemployment, housing affordability and sexual health. We received positive feedback on the conference, with participants commenting:

OUTBURST! WESTERN SYDNEY YOUTH ACTION GROUP

Outburst! members are young people aged 12 – 25 who live, work or study in the Western Sydney local government areas of Auburn, Bankstown, Blacktown, Blue Mountains, Camden, Campbelltown, Fairfield, Holroyd, Hawkesbury, The Hills, Liverpool, Parramatta and Penrith.

In 2014/15, 17 young people actively shaped *Outburst!* activities, such as *Friend2Friend*, and training in the areas of mental health first aid, leadership, communication, and workshop facilitation.

FRIEND2FRIEND

Friend2Friend is a youth-led mental health initiative designed by young people to equip young people with the skills and resources to tackle mental health issues in their local communities. The Friend2Friend model was co-developed by Outburst! members and psychologist Phil Nunn.

Friend2Friend supports young people to run workshops on how to be a good 'mental health buddy' including; how to provide sustainable support to a friend who is experiencing mental health concerns and how to raise awareness of youth mental health issues.

Friend2Friend has been made possible with a grant received from Daily Telegraph Champions of the West Health Grant.

YOUTH CONSULTATION NETWORK (YCN)

The Youth Consultation Network consists of 23 youth representatives, from across NSW. The network is a platform for youth council members to connect and share their experiences, as well as providing an opportunity for young people to get involved in Youth Action's policy and advocacy agenda.

This year YCN members undertook consultations on behalf of Youth Action and received a series of event management training sessions in the lead up to National Youth Week.



UNLEASH

Unleash is Youth Action's bi-monthly magazine of youth opinion and action.

Unleash was published twice in 2014/2015, and will be undergoing an overhaul in 2015/2016 to reach a wider audience and encourage greater youth participation.







DIY REALITY YOUTH GRANTS PROGRAM

Our DIY Reality Youth Grants assist young people in Western Sydney by funding and supporting youth-led initiatives that benefit local young people and their communities.

Young people are also involved in selecting the successful projects and local mentors are identified to support participants through project implementation.

Policy & Advocacy

This year, our 2015 Election Agend focussed our advocacy on nine critical policy areas affecting young people in NSW in the lead-up to the March state election.

NSW ELECTION CAMPAIGN

Youth Action launched our Election Agenda in Youth Week 2014, focusing on 9 issues related to the value of Early Intervention and Prevention. Below are our 9 issues with key wins outlined.

Recommendations

Prevention & Early Intervention Services:

Commit to increase the Child, Youth and Family Support program budget by \$52 million.

Justice Reinvestment:

Fund a pilot of Justice Reinvestment in Bourke.

School Suspension:

Commit to an independent review of School Suspension and Discipline Policy and Practice within the first 100 days of forming government

Alcohol and Other Drugs:

Develop comprehensive alcohol education programs for young people aged 15–17.

Domestic & Family Violence:

Respond to the findings of the Youth Action & White Ribbon Australia's research on youth attitudes to violence

Mental Health:

Fund training for rural youth workers to enable them to identify and work with young people on Mental Health issues, and to assist them to better understanding referral pathways.

Supportive Schools:

Increase youth workers in schools through the Student Support Officer programs and through better linkages between schools and youth services.

Housing:

Commit to improving housing affordability for young people.

Apprenticeships and Traineeships:

Funding for the expansion of the Sydney Alliance Working Start program – which links disadvantaged young people into local apprenticeships.

Commitments from the Baird Government

Domestic & Family Violence:



The Government announced a significant plan to eliminate domestic and family violence and created a new Ministerial Portfolio devoted to this issue.

In June 2015, the Government announced the inclusion of Domestic & Family Violence into the mandatory NSW 7–10 Personal Development, Health and Physical Education (PDHPE) syllabus. Youth Action continues to advocate for the interests of young people in the process.

Mental Health:



The Government allocated \$250,000 for youth mental health first aid training in NSW which was conducted by Wesley Mission throughout the state.

Supportive Schools:



Within its \$150 million 'Supported students, successful students' funding package, the Coalition has devoted \$51.5 million of flexible funding to respond to issues such as cyber safety or bullying. This funding is equivalent to an additional 200 Student Support Officers.

Housing

The Government has pledged to set up a \$1 billion fund for social and affordable housing and \$20 million for a Social Housing Community Improvement Fund.

Apprenticeships and Traineeships:

Although the Sydney Alliance Working Start program was not continued, the Government committed \$86 million to its Reskilling NSW plan which seeks to give scholarships to 200,000 disadvantaged youth to undertake industry apprenticeships and traineeships.

Justice Reinvestment:

The Government has committed to funding a plan to develop a pilot Justice Reinvestment program in Bourke run by Just Reinvest NSW.
